



## Gonville Academy School Sports Impact Report 2015 - 2016

### What is the Sports Premium?

The government has provided £150 million per year for the academic years 2013 / 2014, 2014 / 2015 and 2015 /2016 to increase funding for school sports. The funding has been jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport. The money goes directly to Headteachers to enable them to improve the quality of PE and sport for all children. Each school receives £8,000 plus £5 per pupil in years 1 to 6. At Gonville Academy, this means we will receive approximately £10, 040 in the academic year 2015/16. Schools must spend this on improving their sports and PE provision, but can choose how to do this.

### Our main objectives:

Gonville Academy is a Healthy School and we aim to provide a range of sporting opportunities for our children. Our aspiration is to provide high quality sports education for all of our students, improving their health and fitness and promoting an inclusive ethos, where all students enjoy participating in sporting activities. We provide a wide range of sporting activities to students, including competitive sports events, and have specialist staff who support us in delivering this provision.

### Our Sports Grant was used to:

- conduct an audit of current sports provision and student participation;
- increase the participation of students in school tournaments, including activities across the STEP Academy Trust;
- purchase new sports equipment to support the teaching of PE;
- develop the practice of current teachers in the teaching of PE and healthy lifestyles;
- create opportunities for more able pupils to develop their skills at a higher level;
- increase the number of before and after school sporting clubs on offer;
- develop partnership between sports coaches across the STEP Academy Trust, in order to share good practice and improve provision.

This year, Gonville Academy achieved the Gold School Games Mark award for our commitment to, engagement in and delivery of competitive school sport in 2015 – 2016.





## Impact of Sports Grant Premium 2015 - 2016

### Curriculum

In 2015 – 2016, we employed two sports coaches to deliver PE lessons, from the staffing budget. The Sports Grant Premium was used to enable class teachers to observe and team teach lessons alongside expert teachers. Each teacher participated in two 30 minute sessions.

Every child in Years R – 6 received two hours of PE lessons during 2015 - 2016. Children across the Academy were introduced to a range of activities designed to develop confidence and coordination. The PE curriculum is carefully designed to support learners to:

- understand how to live a healthy lifestyle, and to enjoy and seek opportunities to be physically active;
- to engage in competitive sporting activities that help them to build character and embed our PUPAC values;
- be able to engage in physical activities for a sustained period of time;
- to experience a range of sporting activities and understand their own preferences, aptitudes and abilities.

### Extra-curricular activities

The range of before, after school and lunchtime activities available to pupils across the Academy increased last year. Sporting activities were available for pupils from Reception to Year 6, and included: multi-Skills, ballet, football (boys’ and girls’ teams), netball, basketball, cricket, cheerleading and street dance. The number of students participating increased from 190 (Autumn term) to 224 (Summer term).

### Competitive Sports

At the end of June, all pupils at the Academy participated in a Sports Week, with every Key Stage enjoying a sports day where team work and participation was encouraged. This culminated in a Sports Day Final, where the whole school supported finalists in track and field events. Parents were invited to all events.

Throughout the year, Key Stage 2 pupils had the chance to participate in a number of inter-school competitions, including football, cricket and athletics. For the second year in a row, our football team won the STEP Academy Trust football tournament. The Sports Grant also enabled students to participate in a number of external competitions:

They have met regularly throughout the academic year to share good practice and discuss curriculum ideas. The Academies have worked together to hold regular sporting fixtures and competitions.
